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THE FUNCTION OF THE STATE LIBRARY

By authority of North Dakota Century Code 54-24.2, the State Library was established in 1907 to provide library and information services to agencies of state government and to citizens of the state directly or through local school, public, academic, or special libraries.

During the 1983/85 biennium, the State Library assumed the following new functions: The Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS); a statewide study on automation and its relationship to libraries; and a state government documents microfiche project. Each is described below.

Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS) began broadcasting from the State Library in March, 1984. This service provides special readings, such as the local newspaper and a hook-up to the national "In-Touch" network for those who are blind or physically unable to hold a book. Special receivers are loaned to each patron who is deemed to be blind or physically handicapped, and they may keep the receivers for as long as they wish.

The State Library supports this service by donating space and staff time. All funds for equipment are donated and the coordinator of the service writes many grants and submits them to various agencies and makes personal pleas to local service clubs. The five-year plan for DRIS includes expansion into the Minot area (early 1986) and into the Williston and Dickinson areas.

The State Library, led by its automation staff person, coordinated a plan to study the needs of automation and technology in libraries throughout North Dakota. A Library Automation in North Dakota (LAND) committee was formed to perform a needs assessment and to develop an integrated report for discussion by all library directors. The plan is to have all information gathered and decided upon in order to present requests for funding to various groups during the next biennium.

As charged in the Century Code, the State Library must ensure that all state government documents are preserved in a microfiche format for future access and reference. This project was funded during the 1985 Legislature and work on it was begun during 1985. The State Library plans to have the back issues filmed by the end of 1986.

MAJOR GOALS AND OBJECTIVES STATED

The major goals of the State Library include: coordination of services provided by public, school, academic, and special libraries so that in-state library resources may be shared and utilized by all citizens; to develop and improve public library collections; to improve quality of library services by providing continuing education opportunities for librarians and public library trustees; to provide or arrange for the provision of library services to those patrons who have unique needs such as the blind and physically handicapped, the clientele of institutions, state officials and employees and those without direct local library service; to assist public libraries through advice or consulting services in problem areas such as collection development, technical services and budget and fiscal areas, and to equitably disseminate available grant money according to defined rules and regulations.

The following activities attempted to meet the preceeding goals and objectives:

Bill Status Availability

During the 1985 legislative session, the State Library provided a service that allowed libraries access to current legislative documents via our microcomputer. By just calling in, a library or patron had access to the bill number, committee hearing information, bill activity by date, House or Senate sponsor, bill status summary, or comparison by section number with the Century Code. This service became popular quickly, and we plan to continue it in subsequent sessions.

State Aid to Public Libraries

For the sixth year in a row, the State Library issued State Aid checks to public libraries as a result of the 1979 passage of the State Aid to Public Libraries Law passed during the legislative session that year. Eighty-six checks totaling \$550,000 were distributed by an application process based on \$1.00 per capita for a city and \$1.00 per capita + \$5.00 per square mile for counties. Reports over the last four years have indicated that State Aid money is being used for extra hours in salaries (51%) and purchasing books, audio visuals and materials (49%). Although public libraries are not supposed to "depend" on State Aid for operating their libraries, they would be hard - pressed to operate without it. We must continue to inform, on a year-round basis, our legislators about the valuable services those State Aid dollars bring to their constituents.

Institutional Library Grants

The State Library awarded Institutional Grants in June under the Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title I program. Twenty-five-thousand dollars was distributed to institutional libraries through a competitive grant process. Decisions were based on the institutions' plans for spending the grant money, including their long-range goals and objectives for the individual libraries. The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries assisted the State Library in making the following awards:

At the end of each year, the institution submits a financial report to the State Library, detailing the actual expenditures of the grant money.

Trustee School

The State Library hosted its Fourth Annual Trustee School on January 25, 1985, which was designed to update public library trustees on current issues and allow them to ask for information relating to their duties. The program included: a presentation by Val Morehouse of the State Library staff on uses of microcomputers in small and medium-sized libraries; Diane Caley, Director of Ward County Library, Minot, gave information on how to conduct an effective meeting; Cindy Larson, State Library staffperson, spoke on the availability of Title II Construction Grants and how to apply for them (what constitutes a good project); and State Librarian Ruth Mahan talked on legislative issues and the State Library, and North Dakota Library Association projects. Trustees representing forty libraries attended and also shared common problems and concerns.

Confidentiality of Records

On March 14, 1985, Governor Sinner signed House Bill 1270, sponsored by Representative Michael Unhjem and Senator Gerald Waldera, into law. The bill, resulting from much effort by NDLA and State Library staffer Mary Braaten, relates to records maintained by public libraries, and reads as follows:

"Any record maintained or received by a library receiving public funds, which provides a library patron's name or information sufficient to identify a patron together with the subject about which the patron requested information, is considered private and is excepted from the public records disclosure requirements of Section 44-04-18. These records may be released when required pursuant to a court order or a subpoena."

North Dakota is one of many states that have passed such a law protecting the privacy of its library patrons. To prepare for the implementation of the law, librarians should formally adopt a policy for their library specifically designating which records identifying the names of library users will be confidential, advise all employees of the new law, and resist enforcement of any process or order until a proper showing of a subpoena or court procedure has been made.

Dakota Radio Information Service

The Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS), under the management of Sally Oremland from the State Library, has continued to grow and expand since its inception March, 1984. This radio service to the blind and physically handicapped, housed in the State Library, can be heard in a seventy-five mile radius around Bismarck. Plans for the Minot area to come on board this Fall have been fulfilled. Special receivers are purchased for eligible patrons by donated funds, and distributed on a first come-first served basis. Working together to get the Radio Reading Service on the air were representatives from the Bismarck and Mandan Mayor's Committees Employment of the Handicapped, North Dakota Vocational on the Rehabilitation, North Dakota State Library, Bismarck Veterans Memorial Public Library, and the North Dakota Association for the Blind. The service provides readings of current national magazines, newspapers, and items of interest, as well as the local papers on a daily basis.

Tri-State Automation Institute

The State Library sponsored North Dakota's portion of the second annual Tri-State Automation Conference, held in Bismarck June 17-18. The conference included two workshops held on two consecutive days: one was entitled "Assessment of the Need for Automation Technology" and the second was "The Dynamic Bibliographic Database."

Workshop One presented information on how to assess the prospects for and affordability of automation for a library based upon its size and type. Workshop Two dealt with the ongoing care and maintenance of a shared and growing database, including merging, loading, accessing, enlarging, indexing, announcing and assuring quality. A majority of the public, academic, college, and special libraries were represented through the attendance of their key librarians.

Spring Workshops a Success

The North Dakota State Library, NDLA, and the Continuing Education Review Board co-sponsored two spring workshops in Bismarck and Carrington in April. The two well-attended sessions included "The One Person Library" and "Personnel."

Under workshop leader Jan Feye-Stukas' guidance, the "One Person Library" identified the strengths and weaknesses of the smaller library. Suggestions were given on topics such as weeding, developing more efficient shelving patterns for different types of books, better overall space planning, and recruitment of volunteers.

Dr. Bruce Eberhardt, who gave the "Personnel" workshop, focused on motivating and evaluating employees through a constructive process. Over seventy librarians attended all the sessions, and were very enthusiastic on their evaluations.

Easy Link

Twenty-seven multi-type libraries are currently using the "Easy Link" electronic mail system. Throughout the year, problems that arose were worked through, and Val Morehouse, State Library automation consultant, made a number of on-site visits to do in-depth training and educating regarding the system and computer use. All libraries are billed through the State Library because of the minimum charge per billed agency. Darrell McNamara, State Library staff, spearheaded the original (June, 1984) training, which he brought to four locations throughout the state. The electronic mail interlibrary loan system has proven to be more efficient than the old teletype system, and the microcomputer which facilitates the process is being used for many other functions as well.

Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries

The Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries held four quarterly meetings during the year, chaired by Cynthia Schaff, Council president. The purpose of the Council is to advise the State Library on the expenditure

of federal LSCA funds. The Council has been intimately involved in reviewing grant programs such as Institutional Grants, Title II Construction Grants, and the OCLC Retrospective Conversion Grants, and has been part of the decision - making process for the dissemination of the grant funds.

The Council has also reviewed and advised action on the "Books-by-Mail" program, the School Media Centers Guidelines, rural services and school services provided by the State Library, public relations, and the five-year plan to the federal Department of Education. Their assistance during the year has been very valuable to the State Library.

The North Dakota Library Automation Committee (NDLAC), spearheaded by Val Morehouse of the State Library, was formed in 1984 and met for the second formal meeting in Jamestown on December 5, 1984. Twenty-one libraries were represented along with MINITEX and the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries. A number of issues were discussed. Bill DeJohn updated the group on the status of the RFP for the database tapes. They are currently being handled by LSSI for their management needs. He has since indicated that the MULS project is being automated with a \$200,000 grant from Minnesota State. Reports were shared from the Steering Committee and each sub-committee updated the group on what the activity had been to date. The group gave Val Morehouse the "go ahead" to organize an IBM "Application Transfer Team (ATT) study to look at the state of technology in North Dakota libraries.

Val Morehouse has followed through with organizing the ATT study. On September 4th, the IBM team members met with the two executive sponsors: the Director of Institutions and a representative from the vice-president's office of academic affairs (UND). They discussed the goals and objectives of the study as well as the two executive sponsors' role during the study. On September 5th, the whole automation committee met with the IBM executives, along with the following representatives: Mary Jane Chaussee (Veterans Memorial Public Library, Bismarck), public libraries; Dave Boilard (Harley French Medical Library, UND, Grand Forks), special libraries; Frank Slater (UND Chester Fritz Library, Grand Forks), university libraries; Val Morehouse, State Library; and Jim Rask, UND computer applications. The group defined their goals and objectives, raised issues and questions to be analyzed, and discussed methodology of the study. On September 6th the ATT full team met again to draw up plans for the five-week actual study, which will involve interviewing all levels and types of library-related personnel in Bismarck, Fargo, Grand Forks, and their surrounding areas. A written report is expected by the end of the calendar year.

Interlibrary Loan Workshop

On November 28, 1984, a statewide interlibrary loan meeting/workshop was held at the State Library. Thirty-four ILL librarians, representing multitype libraries participated, covering issues such as ILL procedures and protocol. Resulting from the concern for future ILL problems, the group decided to form a committee to rewrite the statewide ILL manual and to update the ILL code. This committee is currently working on these topics.

OCLC Grants

Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) grants were made available from the State Library for two related projects: Three \$9,000 grants were awarded by the State Llbrary, with advice from the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries, to Valley City Public, Dickinson Public, and Williston Public libraries to assist them in becoming part of the OCLC network. These three libraries received their M300 OCLC workstations in the spring/summer of 1985 and are beginning to catalog new materials. Later this year they will begin retrospective conversion projects on selected areas of their collections. Grants of \$3,000 each were awarded to the following libraries for their retrospective conversion projects: Fargo Public, Minot Public, Grand Forks Public, Jamestown Public (Alfred Dickey), and Mandan Public. Williston, Valley City, and Dickinson will also receive these retro grants.

Public Library Construction

The State Library received \$154,809 in fiscal 1985 from Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) Title II funds. Awards were made by the State Library and a Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries sub-committee to twenty four libraries for public library construction projects. These projects included: handicapped accessability, new building construction, current library renovation, an addition to a current library, energy conservation, and preparation for automation.

The grants were made through a competitive application process and were on a 1:1 matching basis. The largest projects included a new library building for Garrison city, and the renovation of an old Burlington Northern train depot for the city library in Hazen. Hazen held their grand opening on September 14th, and all who attended were impressed with the results.

There are currently funds in Congress' 1986 budget for public library construction through LSCA Title II funding. We should know by October whether they will actually be available. As soon as we know for certain, we will be mailing appplication packets to each public library and encouraging them to think about a construction project that fits into one of the previously mentioned categories.

The statistical reports following the narrative help to evaluate the library services program of the State Library. They include reports on our interlibrary loan activity, our circulation activity, our purchasing activity of books and materials, and our reference and referral activity.

IDENTIFICATION OF TRENDS IN DIRECTION FOR THE STATE LIBRARY

The State Library organized a task force in 1984 comprised of both librarians and citizens to give the State Librarian input into the direction of the State Library. Based on their resulting document, the State Library has taken the action of no longer purchasing fiction materials. This will cause the public from the immediate area to use their public library for this service, and allow staff and materials to concentrate on non-fiction and interlibrary loan within the State Library.

IDENTIFICATION OF TRENDS IN DIRECTION FOR THE STATE LIBRARY (cont.)

The task force also recommended that the State Library provide more consulting assistance in the areas of cataloging, technical processing, reference and interlibrary loan procedures. The State Library has responded by giving workshops and coordinating continuing education programs in these areas to update librarians on the newer methods available.

FUTURE PLANS AND CONCERNS

The State Library depends on federal Library Services and Construction Act (LSCA) money for its day to day operations. Since these funds comprise almost fifty percent of the operating budget, there is a yearly concern that the federal funding will cease and the library would either be phased out or have to drastically reduce services.

The State Library is currently in an automation planning project, as was described previously. Although the planning process began in 1984, the funding and implementation phases should occur during 1986 and 1987. The project, which will include an online circulation and an online catalog system as a basis, plans to include midsize special, public, and academic libraries one to three years after the larger libraries are successfully online. This long term planning process is being led by the State Library in cooperation with many librarians from other types of libraries.

Another long term plan the State Library has developed is that of microfiching the entire year to date collection of government documents. In fulfilling the charge of the Century Code, the State Library must ensure that these North Dakota produced documents will be available for use in the far future by North Dakota citizens. The planning and preparation took place during 1985, and the actual picture – taking activity will take place in 1986 and 1987.

The State Library is committed to improving library service to those in institutions. It will monitor the progress of de-institutionalization and work with the local libraries in developing special services to those communities with group homes.

Short term plans for the State Library include continued service to and development of the blind and physically handicapped programs for patrons in North Dakota; improving library service to those in rural areas without direct service; providing more quality continuing education programs to librarians across the state; and developing a more efficient interlibrary loan process between participating libraries.

RESOURCES AVAILABLE FROM THE STATE LIBRARY

The State Library makes available to any North Dakota citizen, free of charge, an in-depth collection of books, magazines and periodicals; state and federal documents; reference materials covering a multitude of subjects; and qualified librarians to respond to all types of reference requests. The library publishes the minutes of the Governor's Advisory Council on Libraries for use by the pbulic, as well as minutes of staff meetings held on a weekly basis. This information is sent to the Director of Institutions office at the end of each year.

The State Library also publishes a monthly newsletter, "The Flickertale," a monthly checklist of state government publications, "Monthly Checklist,", and has published a directory of state associations and organizations in previous years. All of these publications are available to the public.


