OverDrive Server Maintenance

Between May 3 and July 28, 2022, OverDrive will perform server upgrades to enhance the performance and security of the systems used to access your digital collection.

The upgrades will be completed between 5:00 AM and 7:00 AM Central Time on Tuesdays and Thursdays. Your OverDrive service will be impacted only once for approximately 60 minutes or less.

We expect the impact to be minimal. You will still be able to sign in to the digital collection and browse or read titles, but you may encounter errors when attempting to borrow, place a hold, or return titles during the maintenance period.

Talking Book Services

You've maybe already heard about Talking Books, or may even be a current patron, but have you heard of BARD?

BARD stands for Braille and Audio Reading Download, and with it, you have access to the full catalog of books and magazines from the National Library Services (NLS) for the Blind and Print Disabled. In the same way that you would order books through the Library's Talking Book service, BARD allows you to search, download, and read any of the thousands of titles in our database without having to wait on cartridges coming in the mail. You can use BARD in a regular computer browser, in an Android or iOS phone application, with your current talking book player, or with your own commercial player.

In order to use BARD, you must be part of the Talking Books program. You can find the application for Talking Books at <http://www.library.nd.gov/talkingbooks.html>.

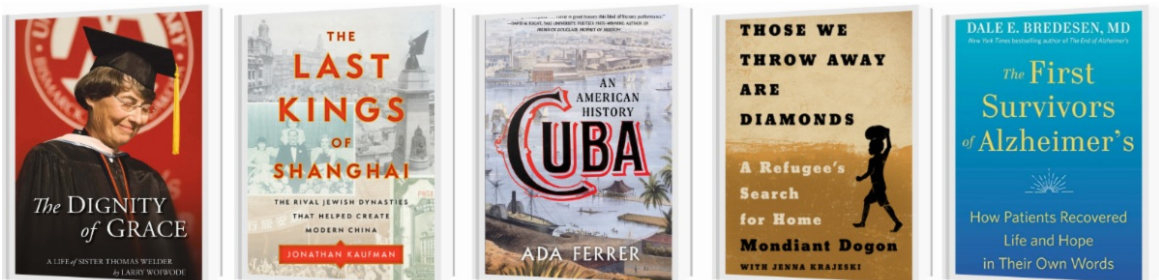

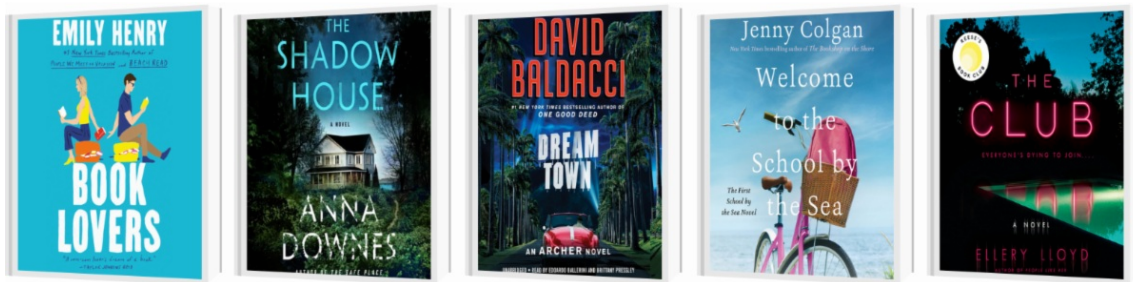

Book Review

"Deep Down Dark: The Untold Stories of 33 Men Buried in a Chilean Mine, and the Miracle That Set Them Free" by Héctor Tobar

An engaging account of the 2010 Chilean mining accident, this book manages to be comprehensive and yet respectful of the men who were rescued. The greatest strength of the novel for me was Tobar showing how psychologically damaging the whole experience was for them, divided into three main parts:

- The horrific 17 days before they were all found alive but united
- The agonizing, divisive weeks they had to wait until they could be tunneled out

- The debilitating shock of becoming the center of international attention while still dealing with their trauma.

This was a claustrophobic novel to read at times, but I do recommend it to anyone who remembers the incident and wants to learn more or to anybody who likes stories about people surviving in extreme circumstances.
