NEW TECHNOLOGY WORKING TO IMPROVE SERVICE

The National Library Service is always looking for better ways to serve the literary needs of its blind and visually impaired patrons across the country. It recently adopted a new computer system which will allow talking book libraries to give patrons better access to their records, make changes to their personal information more easily, and order and receive books more efficiently.

The North Dakota State Library Talking Books Program was chosen as one of the first libraries to use this new system. It has been in place since mid-November. We are proud to be a part of something that will improve our patrons' reading enjoyment regardless of age or ability; however, starting something new doesn't come without a few growing pains.

For instance, some of you may now be getting several books by the same author at the same time, or you may be getting computer-selected books before you get the books you actually request. Some of you may suddenly be getting more books than you want, and some of you may suddenly be getting fewer books than you're used to. You may have also noticed that some of your mail cards no longer tell you when your books are due back.

The Talking Books Staff is aware of these problems. They are only temporary, and we apologize for any inconvenience they may cause. We are working hard to correct them as soon as possible, and we greatly appreciate your patience as we try to fix the errors. We would also appreciate your assistance in identifying anything wrong we may not yet be aware of. We value your positive input, and we know that by working together we can make the transition to this new computer system much smoother.

US CURRENCY READER PROGRAM

NLS has partnered with the Bureau of Engraving and Printing (BEP) in support of its U.S. Currency Reader Program, which will provide currency reader devices, free of charge, to eligible individuals who are blind or visually impaired. The program is part of the U.S. government's Meaningful Access Initiative to assist individuals who experience difficulties identifying U.S. currency. A national rollout of the U.S. Currency Reader Program began in January 2015.

The currency reader, called the iBill Talking Banknote Identifier, is a compact device that announces a note's value in one of three ways: voice, pattern of tones, or pattern of vibrations. Just insert a note into the device and press the button on the side to have the denomination identified. The currency reader does not identify foreign or counterfeit banknotes. The size of a key fob, it can be carried in a pocket or purse, clipped to a belt, or attached to a keychain or lanyard. It operates on a single AAA battery, which typically lasts for more than a year. The initial battery is included. Running with the Antelope is part self-help book, part prairie memoir, and part song of love to North Dakota, which is undergoing a rapid transformation from its agrarian past to a carbon extraction industrial future. 2014

BOOKSHELF FEATURE ON YOUR DIGITAL PLAYER: A HOW TO GUIDE

The bookshelf feature is used to find multiple books and/or magazines on a digital cartridge or flash drive. The following steps are used to access and use the bookshelf feature:

- Step 1 – Press Power on the player.
- Step 2 – Insert the digital cartridge or flash drive.
- Step 3 – Press and hold the Play/Stop button for 4 seconds or until you hear “Bookshelf.” If there are multiple books and/or magazines on the cartridge, the machine will beep once and tell you the number of items on the cartridge. It will say “books” for both magazines and books.
- Step 4 – To find the title you want on the bookshelf, press the Fast-Forward button once for each title. To go back, press the Rewind button once for each title.
- Step 5 – When you find the title you want, press the Play/Stop button twice to listen to your selection.
- Step 6 – To find another title, repeat steps 1 to 5.

*Note: If there is only one book on the cartridge or flash drive, the book shelf feature cannot be accessed.

CHANGES TO MAGAZINE LOAN PERIOD

Subscribers to NLS magazines now have more time to enjoy their favorite publications. The new loan periods for magazines are:

- 3 weeks for cartridges containing only weekly publications
- 7 weeks for cartridges containing at least 1 monthly, bimonthly, or quarterly publication

Please make sure to return magazines promptly so cartridges can be reused. Red magazine containers are mailed directly back to the producer so send only magazine cartridges in those containers. A list of NLS audio magazines appears in each issue of Talking Book Topics. Please contact ND Talking Books with any questions or concerns.

OVERDUE BOOKS

Talking Books has a policy to send out overdue letters to our patrons and we do this for a number of reasons. First, it is a gentle reminder that the books or magazines you have checked out are past the due date. We encourage you to call if you have questions or concerns about the overdue letter. If you need more time, we can easily renew the item for you. We want you to know that your service will never be suspended due to overdues and you will never be assessed a fine.

It also helps us keep track of our patrons. Sometimes a patron will move and forget to inform the library of the address change. When the letter is returned to us, we will attempt to contact you so your record can be updated.

Sometimes patrons never receive a certain title that is checked out to them or the patron sent the book back some time ago and the library never received it. Sending the overdue letter helps bring this matter to our attention.

Something to keep in mind is that other patrons could be waiting for that overdue book. If it is a popular book, most likely there is a waiting list for it. So returning your books in a timely fashion is important.

The loan period is 6 weeks.

TEMPORARY ADDRESS CHANGE

The North Dakota State Library Talking Book Service wants to provide our patrons with books wherever they are. If you spend the winter months in a warmer climate or at a temporary address such as a nursing home, an assisted living facility, or even with a family member, your Talking Book service doesn't have to be interrupted. If you have a temporary change of address, you don't need to send the reading equipment back and stop using the program. If you would like to continue enjoying your favorite stories, please give us a call with the change of address and phone number and we can continue to serve you.

REQUESTED BOOKS

The Talking Book Library handles book requests just like any other library. If the book you request is on the shelf, it will be sent out in the next work day's mail. If the book is not on the shelf, a request will be placed on the book and it will be sent to you in the order the request was placed.

If a request is made for a popular book or author, most likely there is a waiting list for that book. Therefore, we cannot guarantee there will be a copy on the shelf. We can guarantee however, that we will get a copy to you as soon as we possibly can. It is important for books to be returned in a timely fashion so that other patrons on the waiting list can receive a copy to read in (good time?). Your cooperation is greatly appreciated in helping us turn around books for the good of all patrons.

PROBLEMS WITH DIGITAL PLAYER OR CARTRIDGES

Whenever you experience problems with your talking book machine or a talking book cartridge, we encourage you to call us at 1-800-843-9948 or 1-701-328-1408.

Most of the time, we can help you remedy the problem over the phone. If the materials are sent back, that also alerts us to watch for a defective machine or cartridge so we can address the issue.

Please do not put notes in the box with your talking book machine or inside the cartridge box. Including a hand written note inside the boxes changes the shipping rate from Free Matter to First Class mail which requires postage. Thank you.
