### **Library Vision 2004 Update**

Two objectives proposed in LV 2004 are to be undertaken by the State Library beginning in 1998. Objective One is to demonstrate the value of small library collections and thereby increase access to information for all citizens. Objective Two is to document the process of migrating records of one type of operating system onto another system.

State Library staff will add to the ODIN database the records of a school and the public libraries in both Bottineau and Beach. Although these libraries will not be

members of ODIN, their records will be available for use as an on-line catalog for searching their holdings, those of a selected region, or of the entire database. All other libraries and citizens with access to ODIN will have the ability to see the holdings of these four libraries and request them through normal interlibrary loan procedures.

Details of the progress of these "records only" will appear in future issues of the Flickertale.

### **Library Vision 2004 Progress**

Notification of the availability of grant funds for Internet access projects was sent to every library in the state in late January. A total of \$70,000 will be awarded by the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council in May after the review of applications by State Library staff and Council members.

The Council, in its February 6 meeting in Bismarck, heard and approved of two proposals to begin development of the existing systems connectivity aspect of LV 2004. Thom Hendricks, Director of the Mandan Public Library and Systems Manager of the Central Dakota Library Network, presented the projects to streamline ILL between the two different operating systems.

## Rebuilding Prairie Life Shared Past/Shared Future?

The North Dakota State Library in cooperation with the Provincial libraries of Saskatchewan and Manitoba and the Saskatchewan Library Association will sponsor a Joint Prairie Library Conference in Regina on May 7 - 9, 1998. Forty programs have been planned to appeal to all types of libraries including tribal libraries, library supporters, and government officials. Presenters possess a high level of expertise and experience including representatives from the National Library of Canada, the U.S. Department of Agriculture, and North Dakota Lt. Governor Rosemarie Myrdal.

In her brochure introduction, conference planner Marilee Rasmussen, trustee at the Regina Public Library, recognizes that the peoples living on the North American plains have shared a place, a climate, and a way of life. Historically, they have learned the necessity of working together to achieve common ends in a sometimes challenging environment.

There is no doubt that the future prospects for prairie life are rich and vibrant. The 1998 Joint Prairie Library Conference is an indication of the creative synergy that participants from the prairie library community will bring to the task of rebuilding prairie life.

Attendees may want to emphasize the technological - starting with the keynote address of Electronic Access to Information. Many technology sessions will link mere technology to the social issues that technology creates or affects - such as the impact of the Internet on rural libraries and its relevance to prairie life. Or they may want to focus on the sessions that emphasize the concerns of rural libraries - such as the role of the library and its trustees or alternatives in information delivery.

The conference is inexpensive and transportation from designated points can be provided.

## Reference Corner

Time and information help to ensure a greater success rate in filling interlibrary loan requests.

Correct and thorough information is needed to locate the materials in the local or national databases. This information should include where the patron saw or heard of the materials.

A reasonable "not needed after date" will enable the State Library to locate a library that owns the material and then mail the information to you. The longer the "not needed after date" given the greater the number of libraries that can be searched.

Using the time and information factors to your advantage increases the chances of successfully obtaining the materials requested.

### **Library Vision 2004 Moving Towards Reality**

The North Dakota State Library received grant proposals from 31 libraries across the state seeking nearly \$110,000 in matching funds from the Library Vision (LV) 2004 Internet Access Grants program. The applicants are hoping to gain or expand Internet access for their libraries and to serve their patrons.

Examples of the types of programs some libraries would like to implement with grant money include: evening Internet training classes involving parents with children; computer training for adults and children; e-mail access for staff and community members; electronic networking between libraries; electronic bulletin boards; Internet access point in a county courthouse; and electronic job searching.

The 1997 Legislative Session provided \$70,000 of state funds for the Internet access matching fund grant program which was open to all types of libraries including school, public, academic, and special libraries. Each library was allowed to apply for up to \$5,000. The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) is responsible for the distribution of these funds.

LV 2004 is a long-range plan created by the North Dakota library community. It's main goal states that through the statewide community of libraries, all citizens of North Dakota will have convenient and timely access to information for education, work, and recreation. LV 2004 will make Internet access, including the World Wide Web, available to all libraries by the year 2004.

The NDLCC meets in Bismarck on May 1, 1998, to award approximately \$70,000 to those applying libraries whose projects meet the criteria of LV 2004.

### State Library Volunteers Recognized

North Dakota State Library volunteers were among the top ten awards finalists in this year's JC Penney Golden Rule Awards.

The Golden Rule Awards, in its ninth year in the Bismarck-Mandan community, honors those individuals and organizations whose outstanding volunteer service makes communities better places to live and work. (continued)

### State (continued)

State Library volunteers contributed approximately 3,159 working hours over the past year running from April 1, 1997, through March 31, 1998. Volunteers work with Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS), the talking books program, and in the circulation department.

State Library volunteers were recognized for providing information and entertainment to visually, physically, and learning disabled citizens of North Dakota through DRIS and the talking books program. The ceremony took place on April 13 at the Doublewood Inn of Bismarck.

State Library volunteers received a plaque and a \$500 check for making the top ten awards finalists. The money will help pay for future volunteer recognition and appreciation activities sponsored by the State Library.

### Disabled Services Honored With Media Award

The Bismarck Mayor's Committee on Employment of People with Disabilities (BMCEPD) recognized the State Library's Dakota Radio Information Service (DRIS) and the talking books program with the Media Award for 1997.

The BMCEPD bestows the Media Award to an individual, group, or agency that promotes the opportunities for independence for individuals with disabilities, along with providing information to educate the public about services through the use of media.

The Media Award presentation took place at the Annual Awards Banquet on March 26 at the VFW Club in Bismarck.

### Library Vision 2004 Internet Access Grants Awarded

The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) awarded close to \$70,000 to 25 libraries from across the state in the Library Vision (LV) 2004 Internet Access Grants program. The libraries will use the funds to gain or expand Internet access and to better serve their patrons.

Examples of the types of programs the libraries will implement with grant money include: free Internet access for patrons; Internet training classes after working hours for adults; e-mail access and training for staff and community members; electronic networking between libraries; replacing card catalog system with electronic catalog system; electronic interlibrary loan requests; electronic bulletin boards; and electronic job searching.

The 1997 Legislative Session provided the funds for the Internet access matching fund grant program which was open to all types of libraries including school, public, academic, and special libraries. Each applicant library was allowed to apply for up to \$5,000.

LV 2004 is a long-range plan created by the North Dakota library community. It's main goal states that through the statewide community of libraries all citizens of North Dakota will have convenient and timely access to information for education, work, and recreation. One activity of LV 2004 will make Internet access, including the World Wide Web, available to all libraries by the year 2004.

## Federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) Grants Awarded

The North Dakota State Library awarded nine libraries from across the state approximately \$100,000 in funds from the Federal Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) Grants program.

Those libraries receiving the federal funds will use the money to complete projects matching the goals of Library Vision (LV) 2004 in any one or a combination of the following areas: the adding of library records to a North Dakota based database which can be accessed via the Internet; the establishment of sharing partnerships through electronic means among libraries of any type and other agencies (e.g. hospitals, banks, supermarkets, historical societies, extension services, senior centers, etc.); training in the use of technology for library staff and the community.

All types of libraries including school, public, academic, and special libraries were eligible to apply for the amount of funding necessary to complete their specific projects. The North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC) and the North Dakota State Library determined which projects received funding.

LV 2004 is a long-range plan created by the North Dakota library community. It's main goal states that through the statewide community of libraries all citizens of North Dakota will have convenient and timely access to information for education, work, and recreation.



Funding requests for 1999-2001 include \$250,000 for Internet connectivity and to add four to six libraries per year to the statewide database.







Progress on other priorities within Library Vision 2004 include:

- \* Support literacy projects: The State Library in cooperation with the Department of Public Instruction and Literacy North Dakota have begun to revitalize communication and coordination among local literacy groups. This will be accomplished through statewide forums along with print and electronic means.
- \* Involve the people of North Dakota in promoting Library Vision 2004 to assure equitable access to both information technology and basic library service. The State Library has secured private foundation funds to allow for four communities to receive professional library advocacy training. These communities will provide the foundation for a statewide library advocacy initiative. The demonstration communities are Hillsboro, Ellendale, Dickinson, and Rugby.

During the 1999 session, legislative resources including bills, bill status, journals, hearing schedules, and committee lists are available free of charge on-line at http://www.state.nd.us/lr/. This public access service, developed by North Dakota State University, will be updated at least once a day.

### North Dakota Selected For National Library Advocacy Project

North Dakota is one of eight states selected to participate in the Community-Library Advocacy Project funded by the Viburnum Foundation. The ND State Library's grant application was chosen a winner by the Libraries for the Future-Friends of Libraries U.S.A. (LFF-FOLUSA) Advisory Committee. The other states chosen are Georgia, Kentucky, Mississippi, Nebraska, Pennsylvania, Texas, and Vermont. A \$223,000 grant will fund the eight state project.

According to Mike Jaugstetter, ND State Librarian, "We are very excited to be one of only eight states selected for this unique effort. It should help us move from the bottom of the library funding ladder to a position of greater strength and enhanced library services. A basic thrust of the program is the building of lasting coalitions of librarians, trustees, friends, and other community individuals and groups to help build and maintain the kind of information services needed in every community."

Four North Dakota communities have been chosen to receive tailored advocacy training. Those communities are Hillsboro, Ellendale, Rugby, and Dickinson. The program's national sponsors will send a two-person team of expert advocates into these communities for one day training sessions beginning in October 1998.

Ellendale will host the first advocacy training session on October 29. The trainers for the Ellendale session are Penny Hummel, Associate Director of the Oregon Council for the Humanities, and Mary McAfee, who has been actively involved with the San Antonio Public Library for 19 years.

LFF is a national nonprofit organization that advocates on behalf of users of the public library, investigates the rapidly changing information environment, and establishes model projects in libraries. FOLUSA, founded in 1979, is a nonprofit organization that provides its almost 2,500 member groups with a variety of programs and support materials.

The Community-Library Advocacy Project is designed to strengthen library advocacy within local communities around the country through groups like Friends of the Library.

### North Dakota Library Coordinating Council Update

Governor Edward T. Schafer recently announced updates to the composition of the North Dakota Library Coordinating Council (NDLCC).

Rita Traynor of Fargo was reappointed to represent citizens at large for a three year term.
