Federal Library Representative Makes North Dakota Visit

North Dakota had a visitor this summer. He left at the end of the week completely impressed with the state, the people, local library services, and the food.

Robin Cabot, Senior Program Officer for the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS) came to evaluate the impact of IMLS funding on library services in North Dakota. The North Dakota State Library receives Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) funding through IMLS for library services to North Dakotans. (See the Grants column on page 3 for a specific example of the type of funding that North Dakota libraries receive.)

Robin observed that funding provides information and inter-library loan services to North Dakotans, talking books for persons with disabilities, grants to libraries for computer purchases to search the Online Library Resources and ODIN, and connectivity for schools and public libraries to the state's electronic library catalog.

Robin made site visits and met with the library directors from the Minot Public Library, the Velva School and Public Library, the Dickinson Area Public Library, the Bowman Area Public Library, and the Morton Mandan Public Library. Robin discussed the importance of public library board members and the expanding need for teen services and

was amazed by the level of technology available in rural North Dakota libraries. He learned just how good library services can be at small libraries and how far a dollar can stretch.

North Dakota State Library Attends National Book Festival

The festival, hosted by the Library of Congress and Laura Bush, took place on September 27, 2008 on the Capitol Mall in Washington D.C.

The National Book Festival, held each year to celebrate the book, is free and open to the public. This year's festival featured many popular authors including Neil Gaiman, Philippa Gregory, Sandra Brown, Geraldine Brooks, Steven Kellogg, Katherine Paterson, R.L. Stine, Salman Rushdie, and many others. The authors read from their latest books, took questions from the audience, and signed books for those dedicated enough to wait

in impressive lines.


The all day event featured several tents dedicated to literary different genres along with the Library of Congress tent, Book Sales tent and the **Pavilion** of States tent. The Pavilion of States tent had a booth for every state and U.S. territory. Children of all



ages went to each booth and collected stamps on a U.S. map. Those who completed the map received a prize from the Institute of Museum and Library Services. North Dakota's booth was represented by Stephanie Kom and Janet Jury and featured the beautifully illustrated children's book *Gift* Horse: a Lakota Story by S.D. Nelson.

State Library debuts Web-based Training

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The North Dakota State Library is now offering a new avenue for receiving training—webinars. State Library training staff will also continue to travel and present trainings in person. These new online trainings were designed to reach librarians who have limited time and travel budgets for conferences, workshops, and professional development. Online training will offer librarians more flexibility in their daily schedules for attending professional training without having to travel. For instance, the State Library can schedule online trainings in the morning before libraries are open, or trainings can be scheduled at night after hours. Online courses can also be taken at home. A toll free number is provided for the accompanying teleconference. The software does allow for voice over IP (VoIP); however, it's only a one-way conversation. The State Library recommends using either a speakerphone or a set of headphones with a microphone. This allows for a hands-free environment without trying to balance the phone receiver during the training.

Currently, the State Library is offering webinar training for E-rate technology plan writing and an overview of the E-rate program. A webinar describing State Library services for school librarians is also being offered. Registration information and a schedule of webinars is located on the State Library website under "Training Opportunities". Development will continue for other types of web-based training, including Online Library Resource training and other library-related topics.
