Governor Hoeven Releases Budget to Legislature

Governor Hoeven presented his 2009/2011 budget to the legislature early in December. It contained funding for the current North Dakota State Library services, including \$1.2M for State Aid to Public Libraries, \$237,000 for Library Vision 2010, \$200,000 for Online Library Resources, reference and interlibrary loan services, training, talking book and radio reading services, and cataloging and state document services. It also included an optional package of an additional \$100,000 for State Aid to Public Libraries and \$120,000 for Online Library Resources.

This is just the first step in the process which ends with both the House and the Senate making final decisions about the budget.

The Legislature begins January 6, 2009. The State Library will send information out each Friday, beginning January 9, 2009, about library bills, hearings, and other library related information.

Featured Online Resource: Professional Collection

Is your subscription budget for professional journals gasping for breath? Do you need more resources for professional development? Would you like convenient access to professional journals 24 hours a day, seven days a week?



Well, the Professional Collection is available online to all North Dakota citizens, teachers, and librarians. It can be accessed from the North Dakota State Library homepage – just click on “Online Library Resources.” If you logon from home, you just need a library card, which is free. This valuable resource is a product from Gale/Cengage Learning, a world leader in e-research and educational publishing for libraries, schools and businesses.

The Professional Collection is comprised of almost 400 journals targeted to educators and librarians. Most articles are full text and many are peer-reviewed. Here you can find journals relating to almost every academic discipline from sports to psychology, art to nutrition, technology to the humanities, and much more.

A partial listing of journals that focus on librarianship and information technology include: *American Libraries*, *Booklist*, *Computers in Libraries*, *Information Outlook*, *Information Technology & Libraries*, *Library Journal*, *Library Trends*, *Macworld*, *PC World*, *Publisher's Weekly*, *School Library Journal*, and *Teacher Librarian*.

Mini-Grants Awarded

The North Dakota State Library awarded twenty-three North Dakota public and school libraries a “mini-grant” for resource sharing in November, 2008. The LSTA (Library Services and Technology Act) funding, totaling \$67,000, went to libraries whose collections are on WorldCat and who loaned a minimum of 25 items per year for the last five years (2002 – 2007) to other North Dakota libraries. The grant amounts of \$5,000, \$3,000 or \$1,000 were based on the five-year average of items loaned. The grants will purchase materials that will be placed on WorldCat and become available to libraries and citizens throughout the state.

Spring Workshops *Destination: Library*

The 2009 North Dakota State Library Spring Workshops are coming together and there's some good programming in the line-up! This year's workshops will be held in Bismarck on March 23rd and 24th and in Fargo on March 26th and 27th. The locations for Bismarck will be the Best Western Doublewood Hotel and Bismarck State College library. The Fargo locations will be the Best Western Doublewood Inn with the technology classes being taught at the West Fargo Public Library.

The State Library has a great lineup of workshops including technology workshops in both locations. Topics for this year's workshops include: library marketing, developing programs in your library, basic book repair, summer reading programs, and video gaming in your library. A new addition this year will be round table discussions on various library related topics. Technology workshops will feature representatives from ProQuest, EBSCO, and Gale. Another new program addition is being presented by the UND School of Medicine and Health Science staff. This workshop will present Go Local, an online resource that provides information about health services available to the residents of North Dakota. This workshop will also present Medline, an authoritative information resource from the National Library of Medicine, the National Institutes of Health, and other agencies and health-related organizations.

Did You Know?



North Dakota State Library

The North Dakota State Library facilitates 34,000 interlibrary loans annually.

Staff at the North Dakota State Library train over 500 librarians, trustees, and citizens in the use of the statewide catalog and Online Library Resources.

The North Dakota State Library awards and distributes \$800,000 in state and federal grant dollars to public and school libraries statewide.

The North Dakota Talking Book Library sends an average of 1,500 talking books to its patrons per week. That's nearly 78,000 per year!

Public Libraries

North Dakota has 93 public library locations.

There are 220 full-time equivalent staff positions at public libraries across the state, including 31 ALA/MLS professionals.

Public librarians assisted patrons with 395,700 questions in 2007.

Attendance at public libraries totaled 2.3 million in 2007.

School Libraries

294 school librarians teach students in North Dakota's K-12 school libraries.

North Dakota has a total of 380 school libraries.
