Library Jargon and Abbreviations

The profession of librarianship is full of jargon, acronyms, and abbreviations, sometimes known as “librarianese.” This usage of library jargon can be confusing for first-time librarians and staff who are not MLS librarians (there I go using an acronym, MLS- Masters in Library Science). Here is a list of the most commonly used jargon and abbreviations.

- OPAC/PAC- Online Public Access Catalog or Public Access Catalog is the online catalog of materials held by a library or a group of libraries.
- ILS- integrated library system (ILS), also known as a library management system (LMS), is an integrated computer management system for a library that is used to track items owned, requests made, bills paid, and patrons who have borrowed. ILS often encompasses modules of services such as cataloging, acquisitions, circulation, serials, and electronic resources.
- ILL- Interlibrary Loan is a service where a patron from one library can borrow materials from another.
- OLR- Online Library Resources is the term that the North Dakota State Library uses to refer to a group of databases.
- MLIS, MLS, MSLS- Masters of Library and Information Science, Masters of Library Science, Masters of Science in Library Science are master’s degrees in librarianship.
- Weeding- also known as deselection, is a systematic removal of resources from a library’s collection.

This area of NDLA works with youth programs in public and school libraries. Additionally, it handles the Flicker Tale Book Awards. (SLAYS members may serve on the nominating committee.)



SLAYS offers its own listserv. This is a forum meant to discuss concerns, ideas, and tips and tricks about youth librarianship. To subscribe:

- 2) Leave the subject line blank of the e-mail
- 3) In the body (not subject) of the e-mail, enter SUB NDLA-SLAYS yourfirstname yourlastname

Furthermore, SLAYS offers two awards for libraries and library personnel/volunteers: The School Library Benefactor of the Year Award and the Youth Excellence Program of the Year Award. The School Library Benefactor of the Year Award honors an individual or group that has made significant contributions to a school library or school libraries in the state. The Youth Excellence Program of the Year Award honors a person or persons that demonstrate excellence in providing services to youth. The evidence might be in programming efforts, collaboration between different institutions, reading promotion, education assistant, etc. Neither the nominees nor those who conduct the nominating need to be members of NDLA to participate.

PLS 2021 – Changes to the Collection and Circulation Sections

Questions on both the number of items in your collection and the circulation of those items has been generally simplified this year.

For e-resources, there were up to four different collection questions last year. For example, for e-books, there was:

1. Number of Library2Go/OverDrive e-books in library's collection,
2. Number of RBDigital e-books,
3. Number of e-books purchased from other sources, and
4. Total e-books.

This year, there is just Total e-books. Ditto for total e-audiobooks and total downloadable videos.

Free electronic resources are still not counted. Digital magazines, such as those from OverDrive, are still not counted.
