Folk and Fairy Tale STEAM Kits

Hello! Hopefully, you are back into the swing of things after winter break.

Let's talk about hands-on learning opportunities! North Dakota State Library offers a variety of teaching tools. This week, I want to focus on the Fairy and Folk Tales STEAM Kits.



Just a little general information about the kits. All kits have an 8-week checkout period. Three kits can be checked out at a time for one school. A school may request more than three kits at a time; however, they will not receive kits beyond the three until the State Library has received their other checked-out kits back. One member of staff, the library media specialist, should be checking kits out from NDSL. The State Library pays for the kits to be sent out to schools; schools pay for the kits to be returned.

The Fairy and Folk Tales STEAM Kits each contain a book, a Teacher's Card, a Story Card, Student Task Cards, and manipulatives for the students to conduct a STEAM challenge. Some of these kits come with puppets, some come with emotion mirrors, and some come with story wands. Fairy and Folk Tales STEAM Kits are intended to be used with primary students--grades second and third independently, kindergarten and first with adult assistance.

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January is National Braille Literacy Month

World Braille Day is celebrated on the anniversary of Louis Braille's birthday (January 4). Louis Braille lost his vision as a result of an accident as a young child but still managed to invent his system of writing by the age of fifteen. By age twenty, he published his first book on using Braille for writing text and musical notation. Although his system was met with resistance from sighted educators at first, it was preferred by blind students over other systems for its usability and compactness, allowing each letter to be read with only one finger.

The North Dakota State Library offers access to Braille for qualifying individuals in a few different ways. Ebraille is available for download through the NLS BARD app for iOS or Android. The application connects to an external refreshable Braille device, which is the Braille equivalent of an e-book reader. Right now, a commercial refreshable Braille device is required, but the State Library will eventually provide these devices for extended loan sometime in the future.

The State Library can also provide traditional printed Braille books through the U.S. Postal Service through a partnership with the Utah State Library. Braille musical materials can be downloaded through the BARD app, but additional musical reference services and Braille scores are available through a partnership with the NLS music services at the Library of Congress.

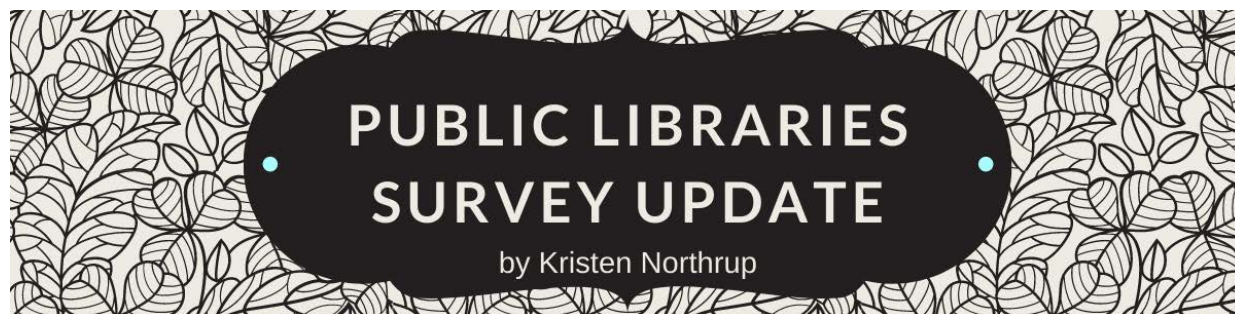
Deadline Approaching for 2022 Public Library Grant for Science Kits

The deadline, January 17, 2022, for submission of your SKPL Science Kit application is fast approaching. Visit the SKPL website at <https://r4.ieee.org/skpl/> for the application form, submission details, and a map of Region 4. Applications submitted after the deadline will not be accepted.

The Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) - *Region 4's Science Kits for Public Libraries (SKPL)* Grant program is offering up to \$2,000 in funding to public libraries to establish a circulating science kits collection. Libraries must be located within Region 4 which includes all of Iowa, Michigan, Minnesota, North Dakota, Wisconsin, and northerly portions of Indiana, Illinois, Ohio, Nebraska, and South Dakota.

Those libraries which have previously applied for the grant but did not receive funding are invited to submit again.

Region 4, Science Kits for Public Libraries (SKPL) organization is a volunteer-based organization affiliated with the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). SKPL believes all children – regardless of race, gender, financial condition, or home environment – should have access to high-quality, hands-on STEM learning experiences. By making catalyst grants available to public libraries, we empower them to start their own science kit collections that are free and accessible to the public.



Public Libraries Survey 2021 - Edit Checks

The Public Libraries Survey (PLS) has built-in error checking. These flags are set by the Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), and the survey cannot be submitted until they are all addressed. Generally, you resolve an edit check by entering an explanation in the notes box. An alternative is that the original response is actually incorrect, such as a typo, and then replacing that number will resolve the issue.

Most edit checks are generated when this year's answer is significantly different than last year's. That can be a sign of data being entered into the incorrect box or a mistyped number. The second most common reason for an edit check is math errors – when a field is supposed to represent a sum of two other fields but does not, for example. We try to avoid as many of these errors as possible by building in auto-calculated fields and will be adding more of those for 2021.

337 edit checks were generated on 2020's PLS, and only 42 of those (12%) were COVID-related. Most were calculation errors that can hopefully be resolved proactively for 2021.

Once the State Library submits the PLS results to IMLS, their staff does review all of the edit checks and requests further detail on any vague notes, so please make your notes more specific than 'This is correct' when possible. We are required to follow up on those.

Staffing questions are one of the most common edit checks that are not in error. When the library has no paid staff or when salaries are paid by a central office, the edit check because staff expenditures equals zero is unavoidable, and I'm afraid you'll just need to make that note each year. However, we do also see frequent cases where either the number of paid staff is zero, but there is a dollar amount given for salaries or vice versa, so please keep an eye on reconciling those areas.

NASA@ My Library Kit Fun With Coding

The "Fun with Coding" NASA@ My Library Kit uses robots, games, and activities to teach participants how to code in a fun way.

Whether the participants are beginners or experienced with coding, the Artie 3000 is a creative way to learn how to code. Artie 3000 has a built-in WiFi server, so all you need is a tablet or other device to control it. Participants design the code, and Artie 3000 draws the lines to create simple or advanced pictures.

Edison Robots V2 is a simple-to-use robot perfect for kids. There are two Edisons, one EdCreate, 2 IR Remotes, and a USB with software, resources, and lesson plans. With the EdCreate, participants can complete five EdBuild projects – EdTank, EdDigger, EdRoboClaw, EdCrane, and the EdPrinter.

This kit also includes the materials needed to create binary bracelets, play a conditional card game, and a robot retriever game. There are also three code games for ages 8+ that are screen-free and designed to build the mental skills needed to fully grasp the concept of coding.



The chenille sticks and pony beads in this kit are not expected to be returned. However, please only use the kit components you need and return the rest for use by other libraries.

According to the American Psychiatric Association, depression affects an estimated one in fifteen adults in a given year, and one in six people will experience depression at some time in their life. Managing Depression is an engaging course that offers an abundance of ideas for taking personal control over the nasty symptoms of depression. Focusing on self-help for mild to moderate depression, this online class identifies the various symptoms of depression and takes a meaningful and sincere approach, primarily to alternative and self-help therapies.

While not excluding or replacing traditional and more conventional therapies, such as counseling and medical support, this course encourages students to take steps to empower themselves to feel better and reviews holistic approaches toward the mind and body. Taking responsibility for as much of the healing process as possible is the first step toward more confidence and self-esteem, even if it simply means making an appointment with a doctor. This class provides an uplifting, upbeat, and realistic approach to depression, which is intended to energize and encourage learners to face their problems head-on.
