

Please do not visit Counting Opinions prior to February 1. Both forms will be briefly visible on and off until then for testing purposes, but they are not ready for data entry.

New Year, New(ish) Collection

The <u>Digital Initiatives Department</u> at the North Dakota State Library celebrated the new year by launching a new digital collection. Well, sort of. One of the existing collections has been rebranded. The popular "North Dakota County and Town Histories" collection is now the "<u>North Dakota Histories</u>" collection.

Don't panic, the collection hasn't moved. It's still accessible in the same place on Digital Horizons.

Why the change? The collection outgrew itself over the last couple of years. It included more than just town and county histories. Church, school, township, and organization histories were also part of the collection.

To more accurately reflect the collection's content, "county and town" was dropped from the name, and we're left with a more precise (and shorter) title: "North Dakota Histories."

The rebranding opened the door for consolidation, and certain items that were previously uploaded to different collections were moved to "North Dakota Histories," where they more accurately belong (such as the book about the <u>100th anniversary of Stern Clothing in Wahpeton</u>, the book about the <u>history of the International Peace Garden</u>, or the multi-volume series of <u>genealogies of people</u> <u>from Towner County</u>). Three new subcollections were created to accommodate the new additions to the collection: ND Biographies, ND Family Histories, and ND Military Histories.

Teen Programming

For this week's Tammy's Teaching Tidbit, I'm going to talk about teens. Programming for middle and high school students can present a major challenge, especially when combatting just how busy of lives teens typically live. The middle and high school years offer more opportunities for classes and extracurriculars, as well as work outside of school. Then, there's the balance of keeping up with social groups, hopefully getting enough sleep, and finding time to maybe (just maybe) sit down for meals instead of eating on the go. In short, teens have a lot going on, and school libraries want to fit into teens' priority lists!

One of the best ways to accommodate for teens' hectic schedules involves using passive or antiprogram activities. Schadlich clarifies anti-programs as activities that are left up for an extended period (such as a whole week) and can be conducted at teens' leisure (2015). Schadlich's book Cooking Up Library Programs Teens and 'Tweens Will Love outlines various options for antiprogramming ideas and is available at the North Dakota State Library.

Another way to draw in tweens and teens is through Teen Advisory Boards. A Teen Advisory Board (TAB) puts teens at the forefront of their own library programming. TABs can be as active or inactive as their participants (and library personnel) want. Some activities TABs have been involved in include helping run school book fairs, creating promotional materials for the library, and planning and running events for peers.

Many public libraries participate in the State Park Pass program, but have you ever checked out the Parks and Recreation website to see what all you can do in our state parks?


